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56; in Wilkes-Barre, Pa., 1856-58; in Clifton Springs, N. Y., 1858-61; and again in Wilkes-Barre, 1861-72. From this time until his death he engaged in business as a real estate, insurance and collection agent. He was at one time an alderman in Wilkes-Barre, which continued to be his residence until his death. This occurred September 12, 1899, at Bear Creek, near Wilkes-Barre, of dilation of the heart, in the seventy-seventh year of his age. He was buried at Wilkes-Barre.

He was twice married: (1) December 8, 1851, at Loekport, N. Y., to Miss Eunice Jones Lattin, who died April 30, 1857; (2) October 5, 1859, at Wilkes-Barre, Pa., to Miss Ellen Elizabeth Brower, who survives him, with one son by his first wife, and one son and three daughters by his second.

JAMES DOAK TADLOCK, D.D., LL.D..

Son of Sevier and Mary (Blair) Tadlock, was born August 4, 1825, in Greene County, Tenn. He united with the Presbyterian Church of Providence, Tenn., at the age of eighteen. He was prepared for college in the Preparatory Department of Washington College, Tenn., and graduated from that college in 1847. Entering the Seminary at Princeton in the same year, he took the full three years' course there and graduated in 1850. He was licensed by the Presbytery of Raritan, April 18, 1849, and ordained an evangelist, November 16, 1850, by the Presbytery of Holston. His life was devoted to teaching, in which he was engaged all the time since 1850, except the years 1863-65, and yet while so engaged he did not fail to preach, supplying at different times the churches of Rocky Spring, Providence, Salem, Leesburg, Jonesboro, Bristol, Johnson City, Walnut Grove, Paperville, Cold Spring and Columbia, all of these being in Tennessee, except Walnut Grove, Va., and Columbia, S. C. Soon after leaving Princeton he was called to a professorship in Washington College, Tenn., where he continued teaching until 1858. He was next president of the Female College of Jonesboro, Tenn., from 1858 to 1863. During the next two years he was stated supply of the church at Jonesboro, the only inter-

ruption of his teaching work until age compelled his retirement from his chair in Columbia Seminary. From 1865 to 1867 he was the principal of a select school in Jonesboro, and of the High School of Bristol, Tenn., 1867-68, serving the Second Church of Bristol as stated supply during this time. In 1868 he was called to the presidency of King College, Tenn., over which institution he presided until 1885, when he was invited to occupy the chair of Ecclesiastical History in the Theological Seminary at Columbia, S. C. This he did with eminent usefulness until 1898, when by reason of the "age rule" he withdrew from the Seminary and returned to Tennessee, residing in Bristol until his death there, August 26, 1899, of a complication of diseases, having just entered upon the 75th year of his age. His body was interred at Bristol. He received the degree of D.D. from Hampton Sidney College in 1876, and that of LL.D. from King College. He published a number of sermons and inaugural addresses.

Dr. Tadlock was married August 8, 1850, in Washington, County, Tenn., to Miss Susan Kelsey McLin, who died September 21, 1875. Three sons and three daughters survive him.

ROBERT BROWN FORESMAN,

Son of Robert Jacob and Sarah (McCormick) Foresman, was born November 9, 1822, in White Deer Valley, Pa. He united with the Presbyterian Church at Washington, Pa., at the age of eighteen. His preparatory studies were pursued in the Mifflinburg Academy, Pa., and he graduated from Lafayette College in 1848. He then spent a year in teaching, being principal of the Classical Academy in Belvidere, N. J. He entered the Seminary at Princeton in 1849, taking the full three years' course there and graduating in 1852. He was licensed by the Presbytery of Northumberland June 13, 1852, and ordained by the Presbytery of Newton May 30, 1854, being at the same time installed pastor of the church at Lower Mt. Bethel, Pa. Previous to his ordination he had served the church of Middleport, Pa., as stated supply from July, 1852, to April, 1854. His relation to
