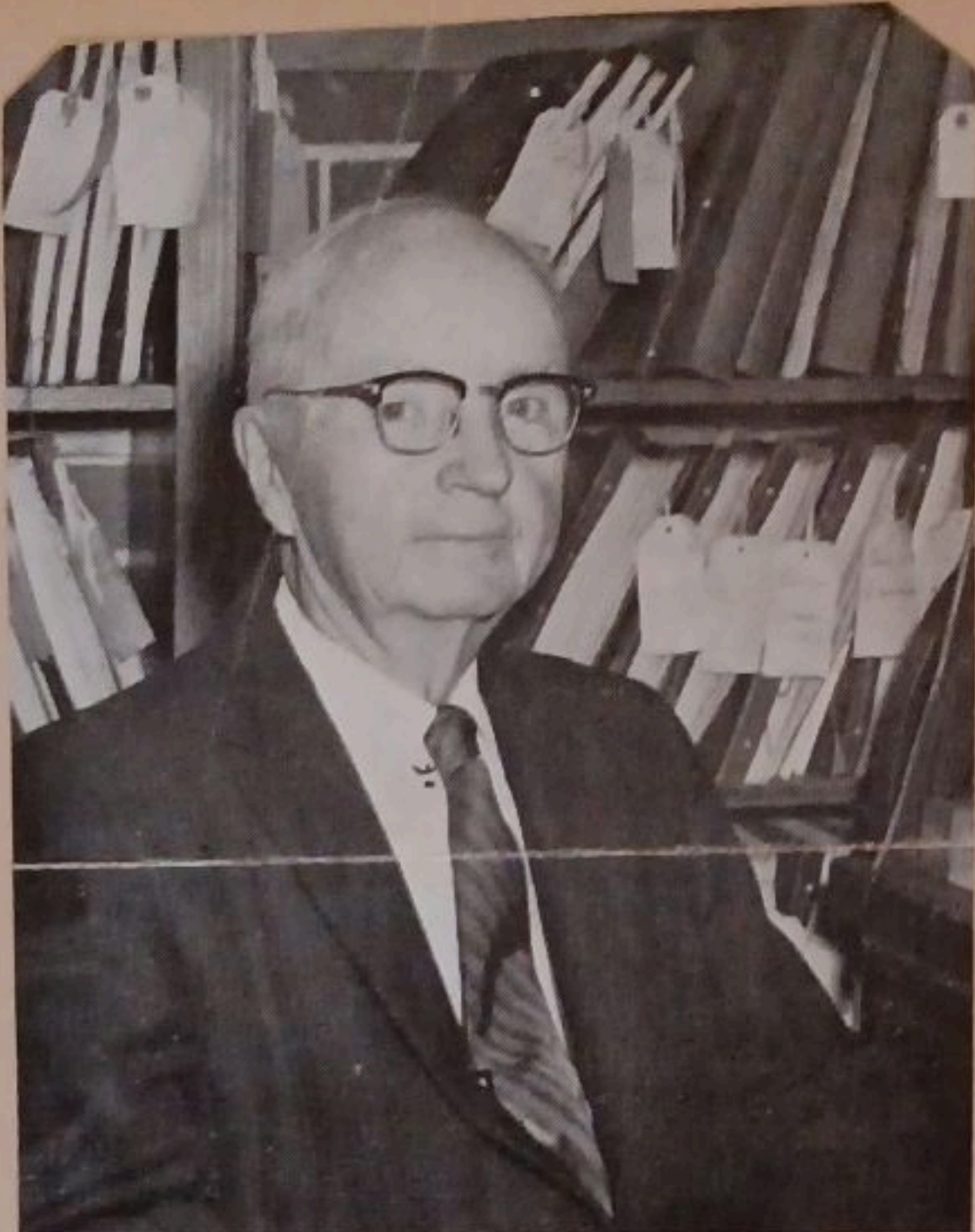




JAMES W. MARSHALL

1882-1964

Rev. James Williams Marshall, Historiographer of the Synod of Alabama, and for long Presbyterian pastor, died at his home in Panama City, Florida, on May 29.

In the course of the preparation of his history of the Church in Alabama, Mr. Marshall probably made as an extensive use of the materials assembled in the Historical Foundation as has been done by any historian since its establishment. For the past thirty-five years or more he has been engaged in assembling data and preparing a manuscript on Alabama Presbyterianism.

Mr. Marshall, son of John Lee and Mrs. Janie Edwards (Foster) Pleasant Marshall, was born at Perdue Hill, Alabama, on January 20, 1882. He was educated at Southwestern Presbyterian University, also attending the Divinity School of that institution, and later studying at McCormick Seminary in Chicago. He was married to Mrs. Marion Lee Stallworth on December 14, 1922.

His ministry was exercised in the Synods of Alabama, Arkansas, and Florida. From 1921 to 1929 he served as Superintendent of Home Missions in the Presbytery of Mobile. At different times he acted as Stated Clerk of Ouachita, Mobile, and Florida Presbyteries, and as that of the Synod of Florida from 1936 to 1940.

He is survived by Mrs. Marshall.
